



Dr Muhammad has served a member of the faculty and administration at East-West University (EWU) in Chicago, Illinois since 1980. He was as a former Chairman of the Division of Liberal Arts & Sciences and Director of the Department of Behavioral Sciences (BHS) until his formal retirement from EWU in January, 2014. He helped prepare and supervise several major multi-million dollar TRIO and Title III grants awarded to EWU by the U.S. Department of Education (USDOE). His graduate training covers the fields of clinical psychology, international studies and human rights policy, with a final concentration in higher educational administration and management.

He earned his B.A. in psychology from Iona College in New Rochelle, N.Y.; his M.A. in clinical psychology from Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois and performed doctoral studies at the New School for Social Research, N.Y.; the State University of N.Y. at Albany; Indiana University at Bloomington; and completed his EdD at the University of Sarasota, Florida (Argosy University). He served as Dean of the Ministry of Education for the Muhammad University of Islam and subsequently the Sister Clara Muhammad Elementary & Secondary National School systems in the 1970s. He has also served on the faculty of the State University of N.Y. at Albany, Rutgers University NJ, Bradley University IL , City Colleges of Chicago, Governors State University and Chicago State University.

Dr. Muhammad is a member of numerous professional associations and is a founding Member of the Directorate of the International Human Rights Association of American

Minorities (IHRAAM), a NGO in Consultative Status with the United Nations (U.N.). He was recently elected CEO of IHRAAM and serves as Chairman of the Core Planning Group – Office of HBCU Development and International Cooperation (OHBCUD). He led a 41-member international IHRAAM delegation to the historic U.N. World Conference Against Racism (WCAR) held in Durban, South Africa (2001).

He has published numerous articles, and in collaboration with IHRAAM, has co-edited several of their publications, the most recent being *“Preserving HBCUs’ Billion Dollar Legacy: International Law, Self-Determination and the Right to Institutions”*. He serves as the Secretary General of the Board of Trustees for the American Islamic College (AIC) in Chicago, Illinois. Dr. Muhammad has traveled extensively throughout Africa, Europe, Canada, the Caribbean and the Middle East. He has adult children and lives with his wife in Chicago. He enjoys traveling, the arts, teaching, and varied sports – especially now that he is retired.
